

The Other Bowling Green


Road trips through Kentucky pretty much guarantee you lots of curves and beautiful scenery, so it is not surprising that our club members have been exploring different parts of that state each summer. This year, four Miatas headed to South Central Kentucky to visit "the other Bowling Green," the largest city in this cave-carved area and a hidden gem.

Bill Potvin and Linda Myers, Tom Thayer, Steve and Pat Dettmer and Greg and Terri Wilkins drove down on a rainy Monday. Our home there was a hotel called "Tru by Hilton." It is advertised as "an appeal to tech-minded, design-savvy millennials." So, of course we fit right in!

Tuesday the sun was shining as we set out to visit Bowling Green's most famous attraction, the National Corvette Museum. We spent a couple of fun hours here enjoying over 70 Corvettes on display, including mint, classics, prototypes, rare finds and racing champs. You might remember that in 2014 a 30 foot sinkhole opened in the Skydome portion of the museum overnight, swallowing eight priceless Corvettes. Security cameras captured the cars falling in. The mangled cars were brought up and some of them were able to be restored. Now there is an interactive, electronic exhibit detailing the collapse, the aftermath and what was learned from the experience. It was educational and very interesting.



Afterwards we headed for lunch at the randomly selected Laura's Stockyard Café. We all hesitated a little when we pulled into the parking lot full of pickup trucks and cowboys and realized this was an



actual working stock yard. But the food was good and certainly the hamburgers were fresh!

In the afternoon we drove the Duncan Hines Scenic Byway. This byway has been written about in numerous publications, including the Reader's Digest Coffee Table Book featuring the most scenic drives in the country. The route is 80 miles of rolling hills that starts and ends at the former home of Duncan Hines (the man behind the cake mix) and loops through Mammoth Cave National Park. We did not have a map, only a list of turns to take with no mileage indication so it was a little challenging.

As we approached the National Park there were numerous signs warning "this road ends in water." With such vague directions that was a little concerning. As we crested a hill and looked down we could see that the road did in fact end in water but fortunately there was a continuously running ferry to get us across. There hadn't been anything in the directions about that so it was a neat surprise. It was a gorgeous top-down drive. We finished the loop fairly early so we headed for drinks at the Preservation Tasting Room and then enjoyed a casual dinner at the Mellow Mushroom.

Wednesday we flipped things around and did our driving first. That route was very rural; the weather was lovely and our tops were down. We had to ford a little stream as it washed across a small bridge; and then we caught up with a large pig in the road. He trotted along next to us for a bit!







After lunch we took an underground boat tour of the Lost River Cave. We heard all about the cave's use as an ancient native hunting ground, a Civil War encampment for both the Union and the Confederacy, a hideout for the infamous outlaw Jesse James and a swinging underground 1930's night club. Then, instead of happy hour drinks after the tour, we stopped and had ice cream at Cheney's Dairy Barn followed by a late dinner at Rafferty's.

This trip was truly one adventure after another. We had lots of fun though and the Kentucky roads did not disappoint!

Saturday, Sept 4, 2021

Eric's Riverrun is a ~240 mile, all-day driving tour using some of Ohio's most interesting and challenging roads. This year we will head east towards Zanesville, then south to the Stockport locks, then to Marietta (a good place for lunch). From Marietta, we will head east on SR26, north on SR260 to some other very fun roads for a finish at Tom's Ice Cream Bowl in Zanesville.

Cars leave from the cinema parking lot behind Bob Evans at I-70 and Rt. 256 in Pickerington between 8 and 9 am. We should be at the Ohio River around Noon and finish by 6 pm., depending on the time spent sightseeing. There is no fixed schedule nor any assigned speeds, other than posted speed limits. This is a tour rather than a rally. The route includes a mix of open and flowing paved roads that connect tight and twisty sections. There are no freeway sections, and all roads are paved.
