After checking in, we got a bit of rest and then made our way to dinner at Jimmie's Ladder 11, a neat restaurant housed in a former fire station. We again enjoyed good food, drink and service and toasted the Wilkins, who had recommended all three of the meal venues that we were to enjoy so much.

After a leisurely breakfast at the motel, our next stop was Carillon Park, featuring a marvelous collection of buildings and exhibits highlighting the technology and history of Dayton dating from 1796. Again, there was more to see than we could manage in the three hours we had allotted, but we did our best. This is certainly a must see location for anyone visiting Dayton. One of the features of the park is the Carillon

Brewing Company, where the decor, food and brewing process replicate that of the 1850's, so it was a natural place for a nice lunch.

Our final stop in Dayton was the nearby Packard Museum, billed as the largest collection of that marque in existence. It was another time machine experience, with cars representing the history of Packard production from 1899 - 1958. We ogled over all of the models on display, but were particularly impressed by those from what most people regard as the "golden era", the 1920's and 1930's.

2022 Riverrun - Saturday, September 3

Eric's Riverrun is a 280 mile, all-day driving tour using some of Ohio's most interesting and challenging roads. This year's route will head south thru Hocking Hills, Zaleski, then south to Ironton, where there are plenty of eating places. After lunch, the route will dip thru Ky and up to Portsmouth (by the Floodwall Mural), then thru Shawnee Forest finishing at Wittich's in Circleville.

Cars leave the Bob Evans at SR 674 (Gender Rd.) & US 33 (Canal Winchester), between 8 and 9 am. Cars should be at the Ohio River around noon and finish by 6 pm., depending on the time spent sightseeing. There is no fixed schedule, and the route includes a mix of open and flowing paved roads that connect tight and twisty sections.
