for the trip is Deal's Gap, also called the Tail of the Dragon. This is an 11 mile stretch of road with 318 very tight turns and no intersecting roads or driveways. Bordered by the Great Smoky Mountains and the Cherokee National Forest, it is famous as one of the most challenging and fun drives in the country. It was very busy this time of year but we were able to drive it several times during the week.

We did lots of other driving, about 200 miles a day, as well. Each day, Monday through Friday, was a different drive. Steve and Pat Beam planned and led a new route one day that took us past Tellico Village and looped through Lenoir City. In celebration of the trip Steve sported a "Tail of the Dragon" hairstyle that was admired by all. Bill Titley of the North Coast Club was the primary organizer who led us the other days on some routes that we have enjoyed in the past, full of twists and turns and beautiful scenery. We took a one day excursion through the Great Smoky Mountain National Park and on up the Blue Ridge Parkway. A highlight was seeing several groups of elk in the meadows in the Park (this was the first we had seen them here). We enjoyed lunch at the Pisgah Inn at an elevation of 5000 feet; beautiful views and delicious food. This year we got to drive over the Fontana Dam, and even drove a short little stint on the Appalachian Trail! The lower drive

to the dam and the Visitor Center were not open but we were able to walk around the dam, which was featured in the 1993 movie, The Fugitive.

Other fun drives took us on the Foothills Parkway and Cherahala Skyway. Friday we stopped at Bald River Falls and then drove Wayah Road through Natahala National Forest in NC. This road is spectacular! It has lots of tight switchbacks as it goes way up over the mountain and then back down and then snakes its way through the shady cover of a mature forest. Over the past 25 years of our Miata ownership, national and regional events hold some of the most exceptional memories. Although our local meanders are fun, there is something special about driving to a completely different locale, and getting together with dozens or even hundreds of new Miata friends.

We have attended these types of events in Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York, Florida, Kentucky, Missouri, Texas, Ontario, Arkansas, North Carolina and Massachusetts. Miatas at Margaritaville, held at Lake of the Ozarks, Missouri will remembered as one of those special ones.



Linda and I were joined by Tom and Fran Thayer, and our adventure started with a two day, 650 mile drive. Taking two days allowed a more leisurely pace and enabled us to avoid cities and a lot of interstate travel. Both going and coming home we stayed in Urbana, Indiana a university town that provided a lot of nice choices of motels and restaurants.

The event was to start with registration on Thursday evening, but we arrived on Tuesday in order to enjoy the beautiful lake area on our own. This worked out well, since the weather was perfect for top-down touring.

A unique feature of this event was that all six planned drives were available on a smartphone app prior to the event. We took advantage of this by completing two of the drives on Wednesday and Thursday on our own, at our own (spirited) pace. It also meant that we could have done all of the drives on our own schedule. We elected to "run with the pack" on Friday and Saturday, however, and that was a good choice, since they were some of the best organized tours we have ever seen at these types of events.





Although there were 90+ cars at the event, each drive was limited to 15 cars plus a leader and "tail gunner" who were in constant communication. We had excellent written instructions in addition to the app, plus FRS radios that were used to call out every turn! The speeds were just right, there was little OTM (other than Miata) traffic, and the rest stops were well placed. And did I mention that they were some of the nicest roads and scenery that you'll find?



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There were no "captive" meals, so we sought out some local places, including a nearby winery/brewery pub. Actually, the Landshark Restaurant at Margaritaville

was surprisingly good, so we dined there outside, overlooking the lake, several times.

There were cars from at least 10 states in attendance, with a couple from New Jersey taking the farthest traveled award. It was interesting to see them all gathered, representing about every year and color. Best of Show went to a women driving a turbocharged, roll bar equipped, soft rubber clad mean machine.

Our great few days and 2000 miles of top-down fun could only have been better if a few more of our NWOhio members could have joined us. Our advice: don't miss the next one!

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
